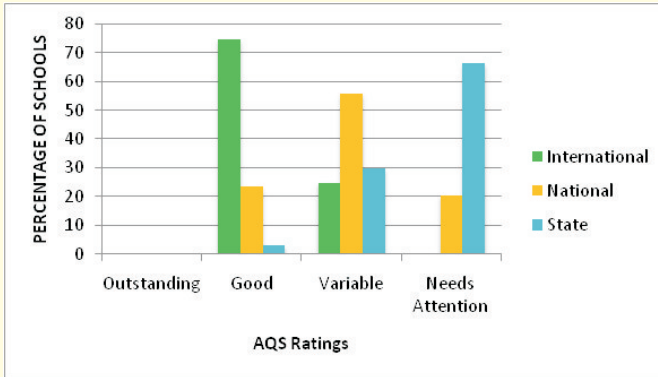


How secure is health and safety?

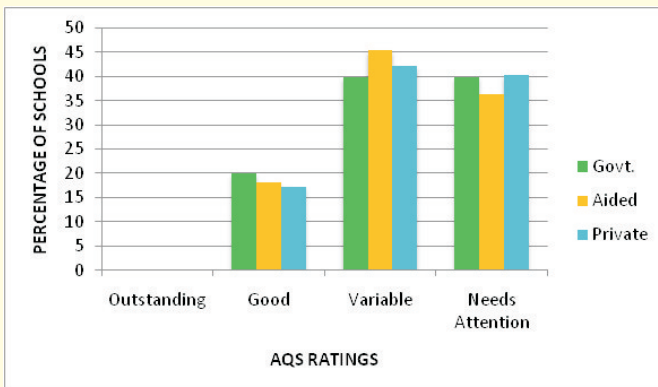

What does good 'Health & Safety' look like in schools

Schools are responsible for day-to-day health and safety whenever children are in the care of school staff - this includes school trips, clubs, after school activities, from the moment the first child steps on to the school premises to the moment the last child leaves for the day.

Good health and safety in a school ensures that all stakeholders are safe and at low risk throughout their association with the school. Stakeholders may be trained in specific health and safety procedures or informed of the requirements as set out by the school. All equipment used by the school must be suitable for the intended use and maintained in a safe condition.

Schools must apply principles of prevention, evaluate risk, establish protective measures and instruct staff. They must have procedures for serious and imminent danger. They must maintain contacts with external services including medical, rescue and emergency services.
